

# Large gifts pace A&I-CC fund drive

Approximately 90 per cent of the total funds raised in the Development Fund Drive for Texas A&I University at Corpus Christi has been donated in contributions of \$5,000 to \$150,000.

John Crutchfield, campaign chairman, said the fund drive has raised \$1,367,368 of the \$1,750,000 goal and that contributions have ranged from \$1 to \$150,000, "but in a drive of this magnitude, large donations are tremendously

important to the attainment of our goal."

Crutchfield added, "We are confident that many additional contributions, both small and large, will be made, and they are all important to the fund drive and the future success of Texas A&I-CC. The 'On to Excellence' program will continue until the goal is reached, and every citizen will have had an opportunity to participate."

The importance of wide

community participation in the drive is basic to the future success of the university, Crutchfield said. "All our citizens should feel they have a stake in the development of this school which will play an important role in the educational, cultural and economic life of our city."

Spiegel ordered to explain ads

CHICAGO (AP) — The Federal Commission Monday ordered Spiegel, Inc., a catalog-sales company, to stop advertising "amounts-off" or "free trial" offers without disclosing restrictions to potential customers.

David H. Allard, FTC hearing examiner, issued the decision on a complaint filed Nov. 8, 1971. The ruling was announced by the commission's Chicago regional office.

He found that Spiegel advertised such offers in catalogs and circulars which he described as deceptive because they were not unconditional and the conditions were not clearly spelled out.

There was no immediate comment from Spiegel on whether the firm intends to appeal the decision.

## Business law offered at Bee College

BEEVILLE (Sp) — A course in business law will be offered at Bee County College during the second session of summer school, to be taught on Tuesday and Thursday from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. for six weeks beginning July 17. The course will be taught by a Beeville lawyer, Mrs. W. Rachel Littlejohn.

The business law course will include discussions of the law involved in common business transactions of individuals and families. It will show students what laws and agencies exist for their protection and help them manage their affairs in a business-like way.

"I see many young people run into debts, unnecessary expenses and other difficulties when they are first on their own because they do not know their legal rights and duties," Mrs. Littlejohn said.

"Many people with families run into needless trouble and debt for the same reason. I hope this course will be useful in showing them how to avoid pitfalls, and how to see that the system of law in which we live is for their protection."

Students may register now through July 17 for the second six-weeks summer term at BCC. Further information about courses and registration may be obtained by calling the BCC registrar.

Mrs. Littlejohn is a native of England, and received her education in public and private

schools in that country and at Cambridge University. She later attended Trinity College, University of Dublin, Eire.

After coming to the United States she continued her

education and received her B.A. cum laude from Baylor University. She received the L.L.B. cum laude from Baylor University School of Law.

While attending Baylor she

served as a member of the Law Review staff and is the author of numerous articles published in the Baylor Law Review and other law journals.

Mrs. Littlejohn became a United States citizen in 1948 and has made her home in Beeville since coming to the United States. She is married to Dr. L. W. Littlejohn of Beeville, a geologist and petroleum engineer. They have two children, Janet and John, both graduates of Baylor University.

Mrs. Littlejohn is a member of the State Bar of Texas and is licensed to practice law in all state courts. She has also been admitted to practice in federal court. She is a member of Texas State Teachers Association, National Council of Teachers of Mathematics and numerous other professional organizations.

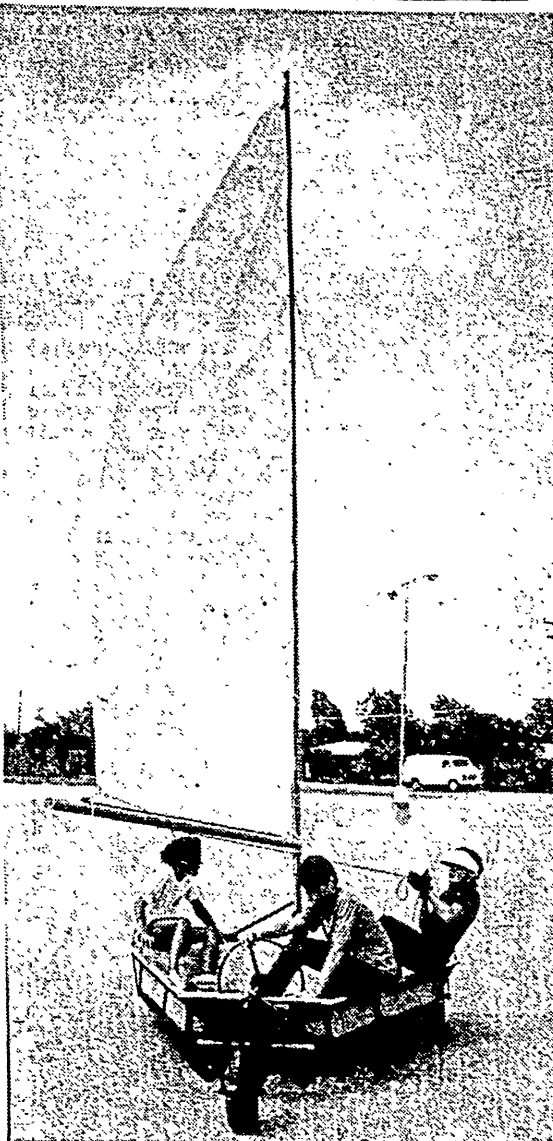

The suit charges the two companies with producing excesses of pollutant-filled smoke, Gulf in January, 1971 and Texaco in November, 1970.

The suit claims the two companies had already been granted variances from the air control standards.

She was a native of DeWitt County and had lived in Goliad most of her life.

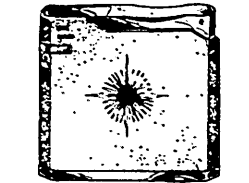
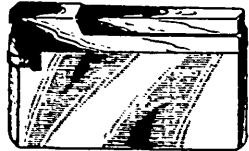

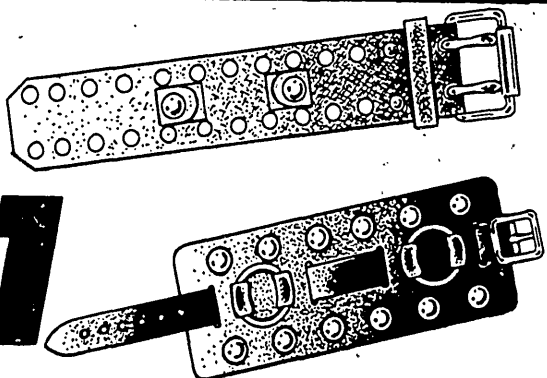

## U.S. announces Sudan refugee aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department announced Monday a donation of \$4.45 million to aid the resettlement of refugees in the Southern Sudan.

Department spokesman Charles W. Bray said that the donation was in response to an appeal by U.N. Secretary-General Kury Waldheim for \$22 million from U.N. members to resettle some 600,000 refugees, who fled their homes during more than a decade of civil war in Sudan.

The contribution will be handled by U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Prince Sadrudin Khan, who is coordinating an international relief program, Bray said.
